The Evangelical Short Circuit

There is fallacy in the evangelical gospel, which is why it fails to produce many saints seeking to live for Christ and separate from the world. The primary message we hear is that whosoever rightly appropriates the sacrifice of Jesus Christ will enjoy everlasting life. Holy living? That will come soon enough in heaven—will it not?

No, quite possibly not soon enough. A reward may be missing.

God's purpose in raising up followers of Jesus is not to save us from hell. Nor is it so he might gain more worshipers. These are byproducts. His purpose is that we be made holy. Not partially, but completely holy because *partial holiness is useless for his purpose*.

The purpose of our lives and perhaps the purpose of God's good creation is to defeat and eradicate evil: to permanently bind Satan and Satan's followers. *But why is it taking so long?*

There is a legal issue. Satan apparently has made the case that since personal pride is inherent in free will, the rebellion that pride tends to foster was not his fault. He is appealing to the justice of God and demanding proof that it could have been otherwise.

This is why God needs us to be perfectly devoted to him of our own free will. Satan believes no one who possesses such freedom will remain unblemished by acts of personal pride for long.

It is like we have in mind earning a Boy-Scout merit badge or at most becoming an Eagle Scout when the government is wanting us to prepare to be soldiers to serve in a war against the enemy.
